FINANCIAL NEWS

Dues: While PVW has maintained roughly the same income over the past several years, costs have been steadily rising. On May 1, 2024, the Board approved a flat \$50 membership fee starting in 2025. This eliminates the early-bird discount and supports our financial stability as our expenses increase.

Finance Committee: The new Finance Committee (FC) is led by VP Thom Lowther and includes Leigh Fulton, Elaine Nunnally and Jeane Stetson. The FC reviews the annual income/expenses of PVW and uses this data to plan for the future. To help reduce the routine financial workload of the Treasurer, the PVW Board has elected to outsource much of the data entry work by hiring a bookkeeper, Candee Roth of Gadfly Ledgers.

WHAT WE REALLY NEED NOW IS A PVW TREASURER to act as a liaison between the Finance Committee and the bookkeeper. Our long-time PVW Treasurer, Donna Sturm has moved on, and we need to find another great PVW volunteer to pick up the reins. The role of the Treasurer will be significantly reduced because of the outsourced data entry and electronic generation of reports. Please contact any member of the Finance Committee for more details.

Judge: Joey P. Mánlapaz





PVW especially pleased to have local was Washingtonian, Joey P. Mánlapaz as our judge. Mánlapaz, earned her MFA in painting from The George Washington University with her ongoing fascination for and concentration on the city of Washington as subject matter. Ms. Mánlapaz exhibits extensively in the U.S. and is recognized for her unique form of painterly photorealism. She is an experienced professor of art having taught at the Corcoran since 1992. Several honors and awards for artistic merit include a coveted 2003 National Book Festival painting commission from the U.S. Library of Congress and First Lady Laura Bush. In 2012, her papers, correspondence and sketchbooks were acquired by the U.S. Library of Congress.

In her comments during the awards ceremony, Ms. Mánlapaz emphasized the importance of a painting's ability to engage the curiosity of the viewer and to convey a story or a message.

We had a total of 441 visitors, and it was wonderful to see so many old friends and members who came out to see the show! There were approximately 60 tabletop paintings. Many paintings and note cards were sold – it helped that we set a minimum of \$20 on note card packets. 64% of our artists sold at least one item. We sold a total of 155 items (78 packs of cards sold).

Tips and Tricks

How do you create 'tactile perspective' in watercolor?

Mak Dehejia raised the question at the PVW annual luncheon about how to create a sense of three-dimensional perspective in watercolor. You can imagine achieving this using thick blobs of oil or acrylic paint — but how do you build up layers in transparent watercolor?? Here is what artist Mitchell Albala* has to say about it:

Atmospheric perspective (also called aerial perspective) works with color and value. As forms recede farther into the distance, value contrasts are reduced, and there is a noticeable shift toward blue and/or violet. Details soften and colors become lighter.

Linear perspective. As lines converge toward a vanishing point in the distance, they create the illusion of movement back into space. The eye, following these diagonals, is drawn through the window that frames our composition.

Tactile perspective uses variations in the texture of the paint to help suggest near and far, to support the illusion of depth within the flat, two-dimensional surface that is our painting. Tactile perspective assigns paint texture according to where that portion of the subject sits in space. (In other words, thicker texture and more details in the foreground).

Input from our members:

Elaine Nunnally: I've been thinking about it and the only way to get actual texture (tactile) is to use actual things mixed up with the paint. Things like sand, paper, string, oatmeal, etc. You can also use modeling paste or other mediums, which are usually used with acrylics. To build up texture, you have to use watercolor from the tube, which I often do. But that's non-traditional for sure! And fun!!

Leigh Culver: With watercolor, you can still vary the amount of pigment to water ratio to achieve a sense of 3-d space. You can use pigment heavy washes in the foreground that appear tactile versus paler washes in the background to achieve atmospheric perspective. It may be more effective to do this with more opaque pigments like yellow ochre or cerulean blue that have some grit to them --but there's no reason you can't put great blobs of any watercolor pigment on the page as well. Look at John Marin's work-sometimes his watercolor pigment is so dense that it sits off the page like impasto passages in oil paintings--and it works in his watercolors in the same way.

Tips and Tricks

"Presenting Our Best"

Have you ever submitted a painting for a PVW show only to be told it doesn't quite make the cut? It can be disappointing when the dreaded Quality Control team flags your entry for a show for a problem. Here are some of the things we look for:

- Backing warped or damaged
- Mat damaged, smudged, stained, or miscut
- Hair or loose particles (including glass or bugs) under the glazing
- Scratches or stains on the plexiglass
- Scratches, stains, paint splatter, or damage on the framing

So why are we sticklers for clean, professional-looking framing and glazing? PVW is a premier professional fine artists' organization. We and our patrons expect top-quality work, especially at a venue like Green Spring Gardens. We want our wonderful paintings to be mounted and displayed with the same care and attention to quality that we apply to the paintings themselves. Prospective purchasers are looking at the whole package – few will forgive or look beyond problems with the framing.

At receiving we do our best to assess whether we can reasonably resolve these problems with glass cleaner, markers, tools, eraser, and microfiber cloths. Often we can, sometimes by dismantling metal frames and reassembling.

The obvious preventive measure is for you to examine your planned submission with critical eyes at least a few days before, so there is time to fix any issues before receiving. If you pulled it out of storage or moved it from a recent exhibit, check it carefully. This includes the back of your painting – choose a professional method and ensure it looks clean. When you have paper glued to the back of your frame, be 100% sure there are none of these problems. We can't undo and redo your paper backing at receiving.

We hear that other art organizations may not have quality control at receiving. That is their choice. Our choice is to exhibit the best we can be.

Green Spring Gardens Show April 30 - June 23, 2024

Originally from Kentucky, our juror, **Fred Markham**, earned his Masters of Fine Arts from George Washington University and has lived in the DC area for twenty years. Since 2007 he has been a professor of painting and drawing at the Woodbridge campus of Northern Virginia Community College.





Juror's Statement for Green Springs Gardens Exhibit

Art embodies a secret. It is a reminder of an intimate exchange between subject and artist that transpires with touch and smell, and intense observation. To represent a subject is to know it deeply. It lives inside of the artist, shaping subsequent experiences and subsequent secrets.

When I look at work, I keep that in mind: "What secret is the artist sharing with us?" and "How well did they get to know their subject." Are they using technique (or lack thereof) to find something in the subject that allows it to reveal itself? I like work that has an honesty to it. A humbleness. Artwork that pays homage to the subject rather than uses that subject to exercise skill. Nearly all the works in this show have a certain honesty and humbleness. (How can we not be humbled by the beauty, complexity, and delicacy of plants?) But the works I selected to honor have more than just honesty and humbleness, they share secrets. They reveal the intimate dialogue between themselves and the subject that gives the work impact and created a lasting impression on me.

This workshop focused on techniques that Stacey thinks are essential for painting animals. She shared how to evaluate value and color prior to painting, mix neutrals, and apply masking fluid to create realistic textures and capture fine details without hard edges.

Exploring Collage: Papers, Stampingand Texture Wednesday, March 20, 2024 with Linda Maldonado

For members looking for a creative leap, Linda laid out some basic collage paper painting techniques with instructor-provided materials to make small collage paintings. She also showed how to paint watercolors on papers textured with rice papers. Linda demonstrated several customized paper methods and students had time to prepare their own using acrylic paint.

Linda will join PVW members Kat Jamieson and Elise Ritter and artist friends Eisabeth Hudgins and Debbie Taylor for an exhibit of floral paintings. The exhibit will be held at the historic house during May and June. In addition, Linda will teach a 4-day collage workshop at the Vienna Arts Society in late May.



Janet Hansen Martinet's painting "Mizzle and Mist" was accepted in the 45th Virginia Watercolor Society (VWS) Exhibition at the Academy Center of the Arts in Lynchburg. Janet's work was based on a photo taken during an unusually rainy and foggy PVW Trip to Maine that happened just before Hurricane Lee struck; she attempted to capture the heaving froth and spray of the waves in her watercolor on yupo.

Linda Holz's painting "Rocky River Reflections" was juried into the 2024 annual exhibition of the Southern Watercolor Society, which will be held in Panama City, Florida. In addition, Linda became a signature member of the Baltimore Watercolor Society in April 2024.

Ginya Truitt Nakata's "Harvest Time" won honorable mention in the January 2024 Still Life Exhibit at The Art League.







Deidre Pistochini's painting "Kauai Girl" was juried into the 45th Annual Virginia Watercolor Society Exhibition. In her words, "This is the first time I have ever painted a portrait. It was inspired by a Hawaiian dancer my husband and I saw perform when we were on the island of Kauai last year." This is the third time Deidre's works have been selected for VWS exhibitions; she has now achieved Signature member status in that organization. Deidre has also been invited to become a member artist at Art a La Carte Gallery, an artists' cooperative located in Occoquan, VA, where she installed her artwork last month. The gallery is open Tuesdays-Sundays, 11:00 am-5:00 pm.

Vita Simms: I've been working on this mural to pair with a metal sculpture as a commission from my church, Calvary Lutheran Church, Silver Spring, MD. I worked on it for 6 months and it was just completed in March 2024. It measures 17 ft wide x 8 ft high. The sculptor is Pastor Frederick W. Kemper, who was my minister growing up.



It was a great honor to paint this mural. The mural is depicting misty rolling hills with rays of the sun breaking over the hills into the blue sky. I wanted to evoke dawn, just before the sun rises. I learned a lot about working with interior acrylic paint and how to scale up my design. I purposely used a limited palette: shades of blue, pink and creamy off-white.

Kathy Sullivan's painting "Intune" was accepted into the Virginia Watercolor Society 2024 Exhibition. Kathy also has been accepted as a Signature Artist into the Baltimore Watercolor Society.

Gretchen Thompson had a one artist show at Goodwin House Alexandria from April 3 to May 7. The show featured many of her black and white portraits, including an unusual group portrait of all the neighbors in her hall, standing arm in arm, viewed from behind.

Alex Tolstoy has been published in Reader's Competition for The Art of Watercolor magazines Vol. 49 ("Sydney Harbor" and "The Dome"), and in Vol. 51 ("Blue Farm"). She has also been involved in ShopKeepArty webinars in April and May, showing the use of yupo, black watercolor paper and other techniques. Her artwork has been shown at Springhill Rec Center for several months since December 2023.





Carolyn Marshall Wright's "Morning at Giverny" was accepted into the Virginia Watercolor Society's 45th Annual Juried Exhibition. Her pieces "Morning Reflections" and "That First Cup of the Morning" were juried into Maryland Federation of Art's Circle Gallery in Annapolis, MD, for their "Reflections" exhibit. "Urban Garden" was accepted into the Patricia Sitar Annual Juried Show at the Sitar Center in Washington, D.C. She was one of five artists showing their abstract work at the Byrne Gallery in Middleburg, VA in March and will be back there for the month of May showing her floral work. Her painting "Just Ripe" received a Special Merit Award from Art and Color 356 magazine in their Open Competition. She has had lots of fun participating in "Artomatic," a seven-week unjuried arts festival in Washington, DC, that transformed an entire vacant office building into a gigantic exhibition space with over 1,000 artists participating.
