In 2020 we are painting on the theme of the "Divine Feminine," with some intriguing early results in landscapes, abstracts, and florals. Meeting together to share poems, artists, and concepts has deepened our appreciation for the theme and for each artist's unique approach. Challenging and rewarding! I look forward to seeing your inspired artwork.

Our 2019 St. Andrews Show was a success. We are pleased so many people came out to see the show and that our sales were respectable in spite of the water main break and road closures. While our sales were not as high as previous years, 49% of our artists sold works. That's amazing.

The following sales information was provided by Donna Sturm:

- 45 artists participated
- 310 attendees
- 15 framed paintings and 44 bin paintings sold
- total sales \$6,143
- card sales \$648
- raffle sales -\$730

Susan Bradley and Ray Goodrow did an outstanding job in planning and executing the show. It takes months of work to put it all together and they worked tirelessly to achieve a smooth-running and visually appealing show.

MEMORIAL AWARD at ST. ANDREW's SHOW HONORS **JEANNE ULRICH** AND **JUDY WENGROVITZ**



Jeanne Ulrich

Jeanne was a talented, award-winning artist. Her watercolor, pastel and charcoal portraits faithfully captured not just the likenesses, but also the emotions of her subjects. She produced them at church fairs, art festivals and on commission,

largely through word of mouth. She was a signature member of the Potomac Valley Watercolorists, The Art League Gallery in Alexandria and The Mattawoman Creek Art Center in Marbury, Maryland. She received a BA with a double major of Mathematics and Physics from Mary Washington College.

In addition to being a celebrated artist, Jeanne was also a mathematician and while working at the Naval Research Laboratory she contracted to work with NASA to write

software to solve the navigation problem for the Trans-Lunar Injection maneuver utilizing celestial navigation and was awarded an official commendation for her contributions to the Apollo Program.

She was an elite athlete and won numerous medals in national and international Masters swimming competitions and completed

36 marathons, including the Marine Marathon, five Boston Marathons, and countless other races. She participated in the 1984 Ironman Triathlon World Championship in Hawaii, taking third place in the 40-44 age group and two more times, taking a second in the 45-49 age group in 1988 and winning the 50-54 age group in 1990.

Jeanne was a crusader for cycling, commuting 5 miles to work on her bicycle for years, rain or shine. She and a few neighbors established the Oxon Hill Bicycle and Trail Club in 1972. It has over 400 members and hundreds of rides each year including the annual century ride (100 miles) in Charles County that attracts about 800 riders each Labor Day.

Jeanne passed away this year after a long and difficult struggle with Multiple System Atrophy, a form of Parkinson's Disease.

Judy Wengrovitz

Judy was one of the earliest members and a past President of PVW. Her amazing career as an artist expanded well beyond her lovely, award-winning paintings. She believed strongly in giving back to



the art community as evidenced by the fact that she was also the past President of Springfield Art Guild, Virginia Watercolor Society and the Alexandria Branch of the National League of American Penwomen.

She taught art classes to both children and adults and was a guest lecturer at various schools and universities. She conducted workshops throughout the country.

Judy had many solo shows and her paintings are in corporate, private, and public collections. Her works were published in numerous art magazines (<u>Artist Magazine</u>, <u>International Artist</u>, and <u>Elan</u>) and books (<u>Best of Watercolor</u>, <u>Best of Watercolor Places</u>, and <u>The Collected Best of Watercolor</u>).

She was a member of the National Watercolor Society, Virginia Watercolor Society, Southern Watercolor Society, and the National Society of Painters in Casein and Acrylic. She is listed in Who's Who in American Art and in Who's Who in the South and Southwest.

WORKSHOPS

Jane Angelhart's portrait workshop in October was one for the books! PVW had 16 members and 4 non-members complete the five-day workshop. Each day, Jane started with a new subject matter for the group to tackle. Her subjects were young and old, diverse and difficult. She provided very faint ink printouts of the person we were to paint on watercolor paper along with a photograph for us to use as reference. She was very thorough with her

She tells her clients, "I am going to make your child the subject of my painting. If you like it, you can buy it, but no pressure." She was a true delight and a humble yet talented artist to have as a teacher. The group asked for critiques on works in progress and she was encouraging and nonjudgmental. Her critiques to the group provided individuals with the next step to work on and she found strengths and potential in each artist's work. We are looking forward to the spring workshop with Robbie Laird where we will turn from realism to abstraction in nature. Thank you to everyone who participated and helped with refreshments! Sarah Andrews and I were grateful for not only a wonderful guest artist but for the easy going attitude of the participants as well.







Alice Kale will be teaching Watercolor Start to Finish on Saturdays and Watercolor: Moving On on Tuesdays during The Art League's winter term.


