**POTOMAC LIBRARY IN MONTGOMERY COUNTY, MD**, has an opportunity for our artists to sign up to display smaller works in their lobby display cabinet. The library has recently reopened after a refurbishment. Artists can display their work for one month and sign up alone or with another artist. Artworks need to be shown on stands; there is no support or hanging system in the cabinet. Sales are handled between an interested purchaser and the artist, not through the library. ACCORDING TO PVW BY-LAWS (Article III, section 6), the age at which membership fees can be waived is 85. In recent years there has been a practice of waiving dues at age 80. After careful discussion, the PVW Board has decided to revert to the age 85 dues waiver beginning in 2024. Any member approved as an "Exempt over 80 member" before Oct. 1, 2023, will continue to be exempt. Several of our members have graciously opted to pay their dues even when they have passed the waiver age, for which they are thanked and given a donation acknowledgement. ### It's time to renew your PVW membership. We are looking forward to our <u>50<sup>th</sup> anniversary year</u>.

The Active Membership Dues\* Schedule is below:

- \$35 if you pay before December 31, 2023, as there is an "early bird" discount of \$15 for early payment.
- **\$50 if paid during January 2024** as dues paid in 2024 are undiscounted.
- \$60 for payments received in February 2024 as late dues are subject to a \$10 late payment fee.

Please note, payment is due by January 31, 2024, and in order to maintain your PVW membership dues must be received by February 29, 2024.

**Inactive Membership Dues are \$15.** Payment is due January 31, 2024 <u>or</u> \$25 for payments received in February 2024 as late payments are subject to a \$10 late payment fee. Inactive members are those members who have been juried into the organization but whose current place of residence or life circumstances prevent them from participating fully in PVW activities, and whose inactive status has been confirmed by the Membership Chair. You will receive an email notice of check payment received from me within a week of receipt. If you do not hear from me within 2 weeks of mailing your check, please email me at <u>nobrunini@gmail.com</u> to make sure your check was not "lost in the mail" which sadly is a risk these days which is why online payment is preferred.

\*Exemptions: You may be exempt from paying dues this year if confirmed by the Membership Chair for one of the following reasons:

- You will be 85 years old or older on or before January 31, 2024
- You were approved as an "Exempt over 80 members" before Oct 1, 2023, or
- You have a serious illness, have recently lost a spouse, or other conditions exist that make it impossible for you to pay dues at this time.

If you believe you are **EXEMPT**, please let me know, email me so I can confirm your status and mark you as "paid." If you are eligible for an exemption but prefer to pay your dues, you may pay the fee as a donation to PVW instead, but please let me know so I can send you a Donor Acknowledgement. #### Michele Hoben – Judge:

Michele Hoben is a 'recovering architect' who is now a full-time artist and arts educator. Known primarily for abstract acrylic works, her roots are in transparent, representational watercolor which she also employed in her architectural practice to communicate design ideas to clients. Her abstract works are in collections throughout North America as well as five additional continents. Michele had this to say about the PVW exhibition:

"Judging PVW's Green Spring Gardens Exhibition was both an honor and a challenge. The quality of the submitted works was so high, it was difficult to cull those that stood out as so many were worthy of awards. My evaluation criteria had some givens, paintings needed to be well crafted, both demonstrating fine watercolor or water medium techniques and presentation (framing and matting), the composition needed to be balanced, interesting and fresh. Pieces that caught my eye were those that brought me in from a distance, with strong value or color contrast yet revealed greater detail as distance narrowed. I also wanted works that revealed the artist, his or her unique expression."

# Tips and Tricks

Who hasn't been frustrated when trying to complete a painting and wondered how other artists do it and make it look so easy? Artists often have learned short-cuts from experience that would help all of us who want to grow and expand our abilities. Here are some tips and tricks from our fellow PVW members that might make your life a bit easier.

- Envision every mark before making it. Imagine edge, value, color, shape and make every touch of the brush a premediated action. Then, evaluate. Did you execute your vision? Did it work? You should find that your connection to your strokes, be they subtle or bold, improves with conscious visualization. (Jean K. Gill)
- One handy trick I've used for unintended splashes or drops is to use a Magic Eraser (very lightly) to scrub away mistakes. Definitely has saved a painting or two where I've accidentally splashed color on a spot that was meant to be white/blank. (Toni Plazibat)
- When I reach a stopping point and I'm not sure whether something is finished, I prop the painting somewhere in the house where I have to pass it constantly. Sometimes it stays there for weeks/months, and sometimes I rotate it sideways or upside down. I let it work on me for an extended period of time. Gradually, it feels like it either needs more or is done. Sometimes, paintings I think are done are clearly NOT done after weeks of letting it absorb in my peripheral vision. And I know just what I need to do. On a few occasions, I've finished something months and even years after I stopped painting them. Surprisingly, though, sometimes the paintings that I'm convinced will need specific changes to be "complete" end up feeling absolutely finished after I absorb them over time. I realize they actually DON'T need anything more. In my experience, the last 5% of work on a painting takes up 95% of the focus/time I spend on that work. (Leigh Culver)
- Once a completed painting is perfectly dry, I take it over to a sink. Holding the painting by the top edge and using a wide brush, I brush water on the back of the painting until the paper curls slightly. That is, the back is very wet. I then place the painting face down between clean sheets of a large pad. I have a pad of paper devoted to flattening. I then place weights - large books - on the pad. after two or three days the painting is dry and flat. I use 140 lb paper. (Arleen Jeszenszky)

As she was unloading paintings in the parking garage, she was approached by a woman who thanked her most warmly for participating in the gallery program, as she had a child with cancer in the hospital and found the artwork personally uplifting. A reminder that artwork has the capacity to really make a difference. Rachel also had paintings exhibited in the AWS online exhibit for associate members, Watercolor USA, and the Green Mountain Watercolor Exhibition, as well as exhibits closer to home.





**Deborah Conn's** painting Unhoused: Tim was accepted by the National Watercolor Society for its 103rd International Open Exhibition, and she was juried in as a Signature Member of NWS. She also became a signature member of the Northwest Watercolor Society with acceptance of her painting Unhoused: Chris to the 2023 Open Exhibition. Deborah's work was recently juried into the 2023 BWS Mid-Atlantic Exhibition, the Pennsylvania Watercolor Society's International Juried Exhibition, and the Virginia Watercolor Society show. Her painting Unhoused: Chris won an Honorable Mention at the August Art League Gallery show. In May, Deborah spent a twoweek paid residency at The Artbarn in Amaranth, PA where she painted nine 8" x 8" portraits of local residents, capped off by an art show and five sales.

Leigh Culver has been painting in Acadia National Park this summer and exhibited with the Plein Air Artists of Acadia in July and with ArtWaves MDI in August. She was one of 25 regional artists selected to participate in the "Hudson to Harbor" weeklong plein air painting event in August, culminating in an Artist Showcase at the Bar Harbor Historical Society.





Jean K. Gill had a piece included in the 2023 NWS Member Exhibition. She received the J. Richeson Award in the 2023 Missouri International Exhibition, the Thornton Oakley Memorial Award in the 122nd PWCS International, and an Award of Merit in the 2023 PWCS Members' Show. She shipped two accepted paintings to the 2023 Rockies West National in Grand Junction, CO, and was awarded 3rd Place. She has a painting included in the upcoming 2023 Rocky Mountain National Watermedia Exhibition and has become a new signature member there. She has been made a Watermedia Elite member (WME) of the Baltimore Watercolor Society. She has also been juried in the upcoming annuals of the Pennsylvania, Virginia, and Baltimore Watercolor Societies.






Jeanne McIntyre had a solo show entitled "Dialogues with Nature" at Greenspring Gardens in June.
